

THE HONORABLE MICHAEL BOUDIN



Judge Michael Boudin has served on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit since 1992, and from 2001 to 2008 was the Court's chief judge. From 1990-1992, Judge Boudin served on the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C. He previously was deputy assistant attorney general in the antitrust division of the justice department from 1987-1990. From 1965-1987, Judge Boudin practiced law at Covington & Burling in Washington, D.C. He has taught part time at Harvard Law School since 1982 and taught at the University of Pennsylvania Law School during the 1984-1985 term. Judge Boudin began his legal career as a clerk for Judge Henry Friendly and, subsequently, Justice John M. Harlan. He is a graduate of Harvard College and Harvard Law School.

THE HONORABLE OWEN J. ROBERTS




Justice Owen J. Roberts was an extraordinary jurist whose devotion to law and to the Constitution marked every stage of his career. After earning his AB in 1895 and LLB in 1898 from the University of Pennsylvania, Roberts served for 20 years on the Penn Law Faculty. Roberts developed a highly successful private practice during this time, but chose to spend most of his career in service to the public sector: as assistant district attorney of Philadelphia County, special United States prosecutor in the Teapot Dome cases, chairman of the commission appointed by President Roosevelt to investigate the Pearl Harbor attack, chairman of the Clemency Board following World War II, and associate justice of the United States Supreme Court from 1930 to 1945. From 1948 through 1951, Roberts served as dean of Penn Law School, where he taught a seminar in constitutional law.

OWEN J. ROBERTS LECTURE

A memorial to the esteemed jurist and former University of Pennsylvania Law School dean, the Owen J. Roberts Lecture in Constitutional Law established an annual lectureship to be delivered by "a nationally prominent person, in either public or academic life, who might be expected to make a significant contribution in legal thought." At its formation in 1956, the lecture series was jointly sponsored by the Law School and its Chapter of the Order of the Coif. The sponsorship group later expanded to include the Law School's Alumni Society. Since 1974, the law firm of Montgomery, McCracken, Walker and Rhodes, which Roberts founded, has funded an endowment to assure the long-term continuation of the lecture series.

Today's lecture marks the 49th in the series of Roberts Lectures, the oldest and among the most distinguished of the endowed lectureships at Penn Law. We hope you will join us in the 2010-2011 academic term when we will present the 50th Owen J. Roberts Memorial Lecture with a historical look at the series and a special celebration of academic excellence at the Law School.
