Professor Huntley is the Director of the National Security Law Program and a Lecturer in Law at Georgetown University Law Center. He comes to Georgetown after serving more than 20 years on active duty in the U.S. Navy as a Judge Advocate General. His last assignment in the Navy was as a Professor at the US Army Judge Advocate General's Legal Center and School where he taught Cyber, Intelligence, and National Security Law as well as Law of the Sea. He previously served as the Deputy Assistant Judge Advocate General of the Navy for National Security Law. Professor Huntley has extensive national security law experience supporting the Special Operations community. He has deployed to Afghanistan twice with a Joint Special Operations Task Force in support of Operation Enduring Freedom and has supported a Joint Special Operations Task Force conducting world-wide counter-terrorism missions. He has also deployed to Qatar, Iraq, and other locations in the CENTCOM AOR. From 2012 to 2017 Professor Huntley was an Adjunct Professor at Georgetown University Law Center where he taught courses on legal issues related to counter-terrorism and hybrid threats. He has a B.A. in International Affairs and a J.D. from the University of Cincinnati, as well as an M.A. in International Relations from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University, and an LL.M. from Harvard Law School.
